Course selections must be made in consultation with faculty advisors. The 2007-08 Academic Register gives full descriptions of courses as well as information on prerequisites. Additional course descriptions may be found within this document.

COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM: Courses numbered 0-49 carry no credit. Courses numbered 50-99 are designated for General Education or other courses that do not count for the major. Courses numbered 100-199 are all introductory level offerings. Courses numbered 200-299 are those at the sophomore/junior level that may also be taken by non-majors. Courses numbered 300-399 are upper-level which are primarily intended for majors, i.e. courses which represent the depth component of the major. Courses numbered 400-499 are all advanced level courses for seniors, including those used to fulfill the Senior Writing Experience (WS), seminars, research, thesis and independent studies.

COURSE LOAD: Written Permission from your advisor is required and must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar when taking less than the normal course load [three (3) courses] per term. See page 2 for information regarding fourth courses.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES: Before you sign up for your first language course at Union, you must check with the Modern Languages department so that the level at which you should be placed can be determined, even if you have studied the same language in high school. You will be given a placement recommendation form that must be brought to the Registrar either during prescheduling or add/drop. For information on prerequisites, please refer to the catalog. No student will be allowed to register for a language course unless they:

- 1) have taken the prerequisite course **here at Union** or
- 2) have a signed placement recommendation form.

DISCLOSURE OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION: Union College hereby designates the following student information as public or "Directory Information." Such information may be disclosed by the institution for any purpose, at its discretion:

Name, address (campus, home, e-mail), telephone numbers, date and place of birth, academic fields of study, dates of attendance, ID photographs, participation in recognized activities and sports, degrees and awards, weight and height of athletic team members, most previous educational agency or institution attended, or other similar information. The College may publicize or respond to requests for such information at its discretion. Fourth Course Policy

The annual tuition at Union allows a student to register for three terms taking three courses per term. This allows students to complete the required 36 courses for graduation. In some Engineering programs as many as 40 courses may be required and those students are permitted to enroll in 10 courses per year. Under certain circumstances students may be allowed to take a fourth course in a term.

Students who are making satisfactory progress in their program of study are allowed to enroll in one fourth course during an academic year at no extra charge, provided they have a GPA of at least 3.3. These courses can be used to enhance the student's academic experience at Union. All such courses will appear on the transcript and can be used to fulfill program requirements; however, they can not be used for the purpose of accelerated graduation. (This includes fourth courses taken on a Term Abroad.)

Fourth courses can also be used to make up a deficiency in credits due to withdrawals or failure or if a student does not have the requisite GPA. A 4th course fee will be charged under these circumstances (for 2007-2008 the fee will be approximately \$2,720). Students whose GPA is below 2.5 will need the written permission of Dean Rosenthal before signing up for a fourth course.

All students, including engineering students, with the exception of Leadership in Medicine (LIM) and Scholar Students will be required to fill out the "Petition to Enroll in a Fourth Course" form. *** DESCRIPTIONS OF COURSES NOT IN THE 2007-2008 ACADEMIC REGISTER ***

ADA 060 Hip Hop Dance 1 Practicum. Prof. C. Domenico. The Hip Hop 1 dance class gives students the opportunity to learn the basic of this popular and important dance form. A style based on routines from street jazz, breaking, popping, and locking. This dance style welcomes students with no previous dance experience and is a dazzling way for students to gain confidence in their body to today's most celebrated pop music. No prerequisite.

ADA 061 Hip Hop Dance II Practicum. Prof. C. Domenico. The Hip Hop II dance class provides trained dancers with a high energy class in an innovative dance style. Hip Hop is urban, it's diverse, and it's forever changing. The freestyle dance fusion gives students the opportunity to develop their own sense of style to the latest hit songs. For intermediate level

AMU 110 CLASS PIANO. Prof. D. McMullen. This course, aimed at students with no experience in piano playing, integrates basics of music theory with learning to play the piano. Students will first learn to read treble and bass clefs at the keyboard and then come to an understanding of keys and basic harmonic principles while learning to play music from a variety of repertoires. Petition Required.

ANT 113 Biological Anthropology. Prof. S. Jones. Biological anthropologists study the evolution of human behavior, and the biological bases — past and present — of the things that make us human. Topics may include the history of evolutionary thought, the genetic basis of evolution, primate evolution and behavior, hominid evolution, child development, human variation, sex and society, and ecology. GenEd: SCIE.

ANT 246 Anthropology of Human Rights Prof. A. Gandsman. In recent years, anthropological discussions of human rights have gone beyond the traditional debate between universalism and relativism sparked by the 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Marginalized peoples who are the traditional subjects of anthropological research are increasingly using human rights rhetoric to advance their own causes or draw attention to their plight. This course will examine philosophical and anthropological discussions of human rights and contemporary debates and controversies surrounding human rights. In particular, we will examine the deployment of truth commissions in the aftermath of political violence, the role of human rights NGOs, contested claims of suffering, and human rights interventions.

ATH 105 Special Topics in Theatre and Dance: Solo Performance. Prof. W. Finlay. Solo performers are grabbing the attention of both main-stream and avant-garde audiences. By dispensing with the traditional ideas of theatre and dance, students will explore this dynamic genre which allows performers to present their own idiosyncratic visions using a multitude of styles and perspectives. Open to both Theatre and Dance students. Petition Required.

ATH 106 Special Topics in Theatre and Dance :Acting Shakespeare. Prof G. Roberts. Clues and hints to playing Shakespeare's verse and prose. This class will be taught by guest Director/Artist Guy Roberts, the founder and Artistic Director of The Austin Shakespeare Festival and will focus on scansion, verse, iambic pentameter and blank verse. Prerequisite: ATH 112 or permission of instructor.

AVA 370 Physical Computing. Prof. F. Orellana. Through the application of basic electronic techniques and the use of a programmable micro-controller called the Basic Stamp 2, this course will explore and control interactive artworks, kinetic sculpture, robotic art, sound works, light art, and performance environments. Prerequisite: AVA 160 or permission of instructor.

BIO 203 Vertebrate Natural History. Prof. K. LoGiudice. This lab-integrated course explores the biology of vertebrate animals with emphasis on understanding the diversity, life history, taxonomy and unique adaptations of local species. The half-time laboratory focuses on developing scientifically sound skills in observation and identification of amphibians, reptiles, mammals and birds. Petition Required.

CHM 291 Research Practicum. Staff. This course is designed for students who want to gain research experience in chemistry under the direction of a faculty member. Expectations include a minimum of four hours per week of lab work, attendance at the weekly seminar and presentation of research results at the Steinmetz Symposium, in addition to other requirements. To receive Pass/Fail credit equivalent to one course, the student must earn 3 consecutive terms of passing grades in CHM 291, 292, 293. Not open to students currently enrolled in CHM 491, 492, 493 or in a CHM Sophomore Scholars Project.

CLS 110 Ancient Egypt: History and Religion. Prof. P. Bedford. This course offers an overview of the history of ancient Egypt from the rise of the state under the first pharaohs (3200BC) to its incorporation into the Hellenistic and Roman empires. Attention is given to political and social organization, foreign relations, and religion based on a study of relevant ancient texts (in translation) and archaeological evidence.

CLS 242/ PHL 242 The Philosophy of Aristotle. Prof. T.Wareh. Students explore the philosophical ideas of Aristotle, perhaps the most celebrated and influential thinker in the history of philosophy. Particular attention will be paid to Aristotle's theory of being, which addresses the organic structure of both living things (plants and animals) and entities whose complex articulation is similarly "organic" (human political communities, works of art and other human artefacts). Readings will be from a variety of Aristotle's writings and may include *Physics*, *Metaphysics*, *On the Soul*, *On the Parts of Animals*, *Politics*, *Poetics*, and Aristotle's writings on logic, ethics, and rhetoric. GenEd:ANC.

CLS 278 /REL 278. Ancient World Mythology. Prof. H. Mueller. The ancient myths of Greece, Rome, Egypt, Mesopotamia, India, Africa, and the Americas allow us to observe the interactions and conflicts of differing peoples, religious traditions, and gods. A comparative approach to sacred stories, to myths, illuminates not only strikingly different conceptions of creation, gods, life after death, and heroes, but also intriguing similarities and influences. GenEd:ANL/LCC.

ECE-325 Acoustics of Speech Communication. Prof. H. Hansor. Acoustics, circuit theory, and signal processing applied to analysis of speech signals; Physiology of speech production; Articulatory phonetics; Acoustical and articulatory description of phonetic features and of prosodic aspects of speech; Perception of speech; Models of speech production and planning; Some applications to recognition and generation of speech by machine, and to the study of speech disorders. Prerequisite: ECE-241

FRN 433/ MLT 214/WGS 216. Prof. L. Loth **Femmes des Amériques: Women Writers of the Francophone Caribbean** This is a course designed for students interested in contemporary Caribbean literature, as well as in the social, political, historical, and cultural topics addressed by women writers of the French speaking Caribbean islands. While the novels and short stories we will read represent the diverse experiences of Caribbean women living in Guadeloupe, Martinique, Haiti, and the United States, they also address many shared concerns which stem from a common post-colonial experience: the psychology of colonization and slavery, the legacy of colonial education, the politics of language, and the act of writing as resistance to domination. The selected texts will allow students to delve into the rich history of French Caribbean women and their various cultures, economic and social structures, traditions and rituals, religious or spiritual beliefs, gender roles, and their search to establish their identity in spaces of oppression. Ultimately, we will examine how each text, in its own specific manner, ponders the intersections of Francophone Caribbean identity and women's identities, which arise from the complex historical, cultural, geographic and linguistic specificities of the Caribbean region. GenEd:CDLA.

IDM 201. "Documentary Filmmaking: Filtering Your World." Prof. J. de Sève. This class introduces students to the basics of documentary filmmaking. While covering enough technical know-how to successfully complete class projects, the class will keep its focus on documentary form and storytelling techniques. Students will practice storyboarding, writing synopses and treatments, and deconstructing well-respected documentaries to analyze how they were made. The primary course activity is the production of a short documentary (around 20 minutes) which can be done individually or in groups of two. Besides his or her own work, the student will be expected to participate in screening nights in which students will share each other's work for peer evaluation and discussion. There is also the option of organizing screenings open to the whole student body.

IDM 260 Social Entrepreneurship. Prof. H. Fried. Entrepreneurs identify opportunities, mobilize resources and make things happen. This course applies the active mindset of the entrepreneur to social organizations. The measure of success is not profit, but change. Passion and mission are the motivators. Examples include feeding the hungry, improving the environment, educating the destitute, housing the poor, training the unskilled, caring for the disenfranchised sick, and much more. Jerroo Billimoria founded Childline in Mumbai, India that provides services to

street children. Veronica Khosa founded Tateni that works with aids victims in South Africa. Jacob Schramm founded College Summit to make college accessible to low-income students in the U.S. And the list goes on. In the course, we will study many examples of social entrepreneurship, identify best and worst practices, work with local social entrepreneurial organizations and identify opportunities to make the world a better place.

MER 371 Introduction To Internal Combustion Engines. Prof. B. Bruno. A technical elective within the mechanical engineering curriculum which focuses on one of the key technologies of our society, the internal combustion engine (ICE). The ICE has been the prime mover behind our transportation systems for almost 100 years. It is probable that it will play a central role in such systems for at least the next 30 years. This course will apply basic engineering principals and analysis to the study of this critically important technology. The course will cover ICE classifications and applications, performance efficiency and scaling parameters, underlying physical processes (combustion, air exchange, engine dynamics, friction etc.) pollution formation, modeling and design practices, and alternative fuels and designs. Factors that govern energy conversion processes in ICEs and their impact on the efficiency of ICEs are studied with particular attention given to environmental and sustainability implications.

MER 473 Nuclear Engineering. Prof. F. Wicks. This course is structured to provide engineering students with the understanding of the design and analysis of nuclear power plants. It starts with the structure of the atom and the physicists who made the seminal discoveries. It defines the requirements for a controllable and self regulating chain reaction. It presents the design of instruments, the fuel loading requirements for a chain reaction, methods for startup and shutdown and systems for safety. It presents the cause and lessons learned from accidents at Three Mile Island and Chernobyl. It defines different types of reactors and the corresponding mechanical design, heat transfer methods and thermodynamic power cycles. It develops an understanding of the nuclear fuel cycle from mining and enrichment of uranium to discharge fuel storage and disposal. A physicist delivers a guest lecture describing how the nuclear processes in the universe can produce the 92 elements found on earth. Prerequisite: MER 333.

MLT 214 Femmes des Amériques: Women Writers of the Francophone Caribbean. Prof. Loth. See FRN 433.

MLT 290 Person and Possession in Modern China. Prof. Z. Zhang. How does a person define her or his personhood? How does a person master her or his own fate in a consumer society teeming with commodities, spectacles and specters? Twentieth century Chinese writers and film directors have come up with different answers. As China moves towards a capitalist market economy that valorizes “the successful person,” property-owning appears to play a significant role in defining personhood. The course particularly explores the relation between self formation and property owning in modern China. Through reading literature and viewing films, we examine various factors that inform personhood formation, such as disunified self and segregated space, the rural and the urban, global imagination and local reality, compassion and commodity, gender dynamics and material transaction, modernization and morality. Primary authors include Lu Xun, Ba Jin, Lao She, Cao Yu, Zhou Xiaowen, Zhang Yang, and Wang Anyi. All text are in English translation. Applicable for East Asian Studies. GenEd:CDEA.

MTH 056 History of Mathematics. Prof. K. Plofker. Open to all students with a mathematical background up to and including pre-calculus, “History of Mathematics” traces the development of mathematical ideas and methods in literate cultures from ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia, to Hellenistic Greece and Medieval China, India and the Islamic world, up through the dawn of calculus at the start of the Scientific Revolution in early modern Europe. We will examine the interlinked changes and intercultural transmission of basic numeracy, arithmetic, geometry, trigonometry, algebra, practical computation and approximation, and concepts of the infinitely large and small.

PHL 240 Contemplative Social Justice Ethics. Prof. L. Patrik. Social justice theories and practices aim to eliminate discrimination and unfairness. Racism, the lack of economic and educational opportunities, the spread of violence in poor communities, and the expanded use of incarceration for non-violent criminals are social justice problems. Social work organizations are directly involved in helping people affected by these problems, and some of these non-profit organizations use contemplative practices in their training of staff and in their programs for clients. This course investigates philosophical theories of altruism as well as several contemplative practices that are applied in social work projects. Students will study some of these contemplative practices and visit social work projects applying contemplation in their training of staff and their service to clients. There are three required field trips to non-profit organizations that use contemplative practices. The course has been scheduled for a once-a-week, all Tuesday afternoon time slot in order to fit in these field trips, but it will be necessary for at least one of these fieldtrips to run over into Tuesday evening. Applicable for Religious Studies.

PHL 242 The Philosophy of Aristotle. Prof. T. Wareh. See CLS 242

POR 200 Intermediate Portuguese I. Prof Garcia. An intensive and accelerated grammar review, and vocabulary growth. This course furthers the development of conversation, reading and writing skills based on a variety of cultural texts and authentic cultural artifacts. Prerequisite: POR 104T. LCC

PSC 050 Pi Sigma Alpha Journal Practicum. Prof. Oxley. This course will be designed to provide guidance and hands-on experience for editing a research journal. Students enrolled in the course will be serving on the editorial board of the *Pi Sigma Alpha Undergraduate Journal of Politics*. This journal, sponsored by Pi Sigma Alpha, the national political science honor society, will be hosted by Union College for three years beginning in the Fall of 2007. The journal publishes manuscripts from undergraduate political science students from across the nation. Editorial board membership will be open to all Union members of Pi Sigma Alpha. Prerequisite: Pi Sigma Alpha membership. Petition required.

PSC 223 Critical Comparisons. Prof. R. Hislope. Introduction to qualitative methods in comparative politics; the methodology of comparison; concept formation and innovation; theory-testing and evaluation; the survey of core comparative categories. Preparation of students to conduct in-depth comparative study of political phenomena. Prerequisite: PSC 112 Global Politics or Sophomore Status. GenEd: WAC. Petition Required.

PSC 242R Challenges to Democracy in Latin America. Prof. G. Seri. Democracies in Latin America confront a number of challenges, obstacles, and dilemmas that frequently put their continuity at risk. With the format of a research seminar, this course will explore five thematic clusters: Social indicators on rights and inequality, political identities and citizenship, political and legal institutions, life and economic growth after Neoliberalism, and public safety, crime, and state violence. A preoccupation with some of the most urgent challenges faced by democratization in the region will also lead us to assess actual and potential responses. GenEd: CDLA/WAC. Petition Required

PSC 258 Chinese Foreign Policy. Prof. W. Zhang. This course surveys the main developments in Chinese foreign policy since the founding of the People's Republic of China. It analyzes China's relations with the world superpower(s) and its neighbors and examines China's rise as a world power and the impact this has on the balance of power in Asia and the world. It explains the behavior of China from the standpoint of competing theories of international relations. GenEd: CDEA/LCC.

PSC 285 Electoral Reform. Prof. C. Brown. This course examines the structure and practices of the presidential election process in the U.S. with a view to analyzing the political implications of several proposed reform alternatives. Topics covered will include, among others, Electoral College reform, nomination process reform, campaign finance reform, and reforming the ways in which voters receive information. Prerequisite: PSC 111, 112 or Sophomore Standing.

PSC 286 American Jury Trial. Prof. R. Cusick. Americans have been fascinated with the public jury trial since before the Founding. Two hundred years ago they massed outside the courthouses and listened to the reported testimony repeated outside. The same crowds awaited the verdicts of the juries inside. Today, their descendents follow the trials on television and the Internet. This course will examine the role of the jury in American justice including its history, strengths and weaknesses by considering the theory and practice of the American jury in both civil and criminal actions. The focus of the course will be upon some so-called ‘show trials’ beginning as far back as the trial of Aaron Burr up to and including contemporary trials such as O.J. Simpson and Scott Peterson. Prerequisite: PSC 111, 112 or Sophomore Standing.

PSC 335 Police, Security, and Biopower. Prof. G. Seri. While the development of a political community presupposes a certain level of *security*, the second half of the 20th century shows how unfortunately frequent it has become for people to turn into victims of the devices they set to secure themselves. How can the tensions between the political and security be addressed to enhance, not to destroy, the freedom and creativity that characterize a political community? Organized as a seminar, and heavy in contemporary political theory, this course will explore both practical and theoretical relations between political communities and the pre-political preconditions for their preservation. Prerequisite: PSC 113 or Sophomore Standing.

PSY 331 Psychology of Emotion. Prof. J. Hart. Examination and evaluation of scientific theories and research about emotion, including the evolution and development of emotions, the physiological and neurological underpinnings of emotions, individual differences and psychopathology, and the role of emotions in close relationships and everyday life. Petition Required.

PSY 347 Psychology of Sexuality Prof. S. Benack. In this class, we will examine sexual preferences as a category of human experience and behavior. The focus will be to ask general questions about human’s choice of the gender of their sexual partners and their preferred sexual behaviors; our goal will be to determine what is true for people in general, across time and cultures. We will **not** focus on the psychology of particular sexual identities in modern American culture (e.g., topics like coming out, gay relationships, the development of gay/bi/queer identity, homophobia, effects of prejudice, etc.). Petition Required.

PSY 411 Seminar in Clinical Neuropsychology. Prof. C. Anderson-Hanley. This is an advanced seminar regarding a specific subdiscipline of the field of psychology. Through this course you should gain a close-up view into the field of Clinical Neuropsychology, which aims to explore the relationship between brain function and behavior, especially the evaluation and treatment of the brain damaged individuals. This will be accomplished through lecture, readings, discussions, field-work/service-learning, and other hands-on-practice experiences. Prerequisites: two of the following: 1)PSY 250, 2)PSY 352, 3)PSY 210 or 220. Petition Required.

REL 205 Religion, War, and Peace: Topics in Contemporary American Religion and Society. Prof. T. P. Boland Jr. This course will offer critical reflection and debate on the morality of war and peace from a religious perspective. The course will explore the two major religious traditions regarding the use of violence—just war theory and pacifism/nonviolence—as well as focus on historical and contemporary religious figures and their contributions to the shaping of American attitudes toward war and peace. American involvement in World War II, the Vietnam War, and the present Iraq War and the war on terror will be examined.

REL215 Introduction to Eco-Theology: Religion And Nature. Dr. H. Margulies. This course examines prominent religious and ethical worldviews (Dialogical, Zen-Buddhist, Biblical, organic, mechanistic, preservationist, conservationist, spiritual and secular stewardship, for example) that have guided human action toward the natural world. We will review issues in environmental ethics and policy within a context that includes religious approaches to environmental philosophy and ecological theology. In this course we will review case studies with special emphasis on the religious environmental discourse in different hemispheres and cultures. We will place particular attention at how environmental policy is approached, defined and applied in some of the poorer and post-colonial nations of the third world (primarily in Latin America). We will compare philosophical and theological assumptions underlying the connections between nature and culture in American ecological thought, in the West in general, in the traditions stemming from Eastern spirituality and in the Third World.

REL 278. Ancient World Mythology. Prof. H. Mueller. See CLS 278

SPN 305 Music Videos and Reality Television in Contemporary Spanish Literature. Prof. C. Henseler. In this course we will analyze two novels, *Héroes* (1993) by Ray Loriga and *Veo veo* (1996) by Gabriela Bustelo, through theoretical articles and examples of music videos clips and reality television shows. Students will gain a historical and socio-cultural understanding of the characteristics that define contemporary Spanish Generation X narrative, and they will learn close reading and literary analytical skills.

SPN 403/WGS 403 The “Second Sex” in Latin America: Women’s Writing in the Twentieth Century. Prof. V. Martinez. This course will focus on the ways in which female writers have expressed their struggle against powerful patriarchal systems, and how they have worked and continue to work toward gaining an equal voice in the literature of the Americas. Readings include narrative, theater and poetry by well-known and lesser-known women writers from various Latin-American countries. GenEd: CDLA/LCC

SPN 449/WGS 449 Born in the Text: Daughter –Mother Relationships in Spanish American Literature. Prof. R. Brougham. Many Spanish-American authors, poets, playwrights, and essayists write about mothers, as a means of defining themselves on the inside, outside, and the sidelines of their culture and society. In this course we will read texts written by women who incorporate the daughter-mother relationship into their work. We will study the daughter-mother theme and the implications these mothers-biological, cultural, and iconic-have on the daughters of Spanish America. GenEd: CDLA/LCC/WS.

WGS 216 Femmes des Amériques: Women Writers of the Francophone Caribbean. Prof. Loth. See FRN 433.

WGS 403 The “Second Sex” in Latin America: Women’s Writing in the Twentieth Century. Prof. V. Martinez. See SPN 403

WGS 449 Born in the Text: Daughter –Mother Relationships in Spanish American Literature. Prof. R. Brougham. See SPN 449

Understanding the New General Education distribution requirements

First-Year Preceptorial and Sophomore Research Seminar:

- First-year students will be assigned to an FPR section during Fall or Winter term of their first year.
- Sophomores will be assigned to an SRS in one term during their sophomore year. Rising sophomores will be given an opportunity to express their preference for SRS topic and term in April, prior to the pre-registration period for Fall term.
- Note that neither FPR nor SRS will be credited toward any major or minor.

Social Sciences (1) - Any course listed in a Social Sciences department will satisfy the Social Sciences distribution requirement.

Humanities (2) one must be a literature course.

- Any course listed in a Humanities department will satisfy the Humanities distribution requirement.
- Any MLT course will satisfy the literature requirement.
- Any course previously assigned "L" (AML, AMLS, ANL, ANLS, EUL, EULS) will satisfy the Literature requirement under the Humanities distribution requirement.

Linguistic and Cultural Competency (2)

- Any sequence of two courses in one foreign language at level 101 or higher will satisfy the LCC requirement.
- Any course previously assigned CDA, CDEA or CDLA, or any course carrying the new LCC designation will count toward the LCC requirement.
- Any full term abroad will satisfy both LCC requirement. A miniterm satisfies both LCC requirements only if it is associated with an on-campus pre- and/or post-term seminar.

Quantitative and Mathematical Reasoning (1)

- Any course previously carrying the MATH designation or carrying the QMR designation will satisfy the QMR requirement.

Science and Technology (2)

- Any course listed as SCLB (whether counted toward the major or not) will satisfy the Science with Lab requirement.
- Any course previously carrying the SCIE, SCLB, SCMJ or SCMT designations or listed by a department in Division 4, or carrying the new ST designation will satisfy the second Science/Technology requirement.

Clusters

- Any three courses in an approved cluster, from at least 2 different departments, satisfy the Cluster requirement. Information about clusters may be found at:

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT COURSE CURRICULUM REVISION:

The English department has made substantial changes to their curriculum effective with the Fall 2006 course offerings. English majors should meet with their advisers to discuss the impact of these changes on their program of study if they have not already done so.

Students wishing to take English courses to satisfy GenEd requirements may take Intermediate Courses after taking one Introductory Course. For most Intermediate Courses, either of the Introductory Courses (EGL 100 or 101) will suffice. **However, during the transition from the old GenEd program to the new core components curriculum, students who have taken *any* English department course will be considered to have met the requirement for an Introductory Course.**

In Addition for the class of 2008; any literature course will satisfy the Section I GenEd requirement regardless of the student's history/survey or European/American track.

Any Gen Ed student who has not yet taken an English course will need to enroll in Introduction to Literary Studies. Gen Ed students who have taken one English course may enroll in an intermediate (200-level) course. Gen Ed students who have taken two English courses may enroll in an intermediate (200-level) course or a junior seminar (300-level). Senior seminars (400-level) are reserved exclusively for majors.

MULTIPLE SECTION COURSES: SPECIAL NOTE TO ALL STUDENTS SIGNING UP FOR COURSES WHICH HAVE MULTIPLE SECTIONS, ESPECIALLY IN THE SCIENCES: Due to the possibility of over and under enrollments in certain sections of multiple section courses, the Registrar's Office, at the request of department chairs, may switch students out of their originally scheduled courses in order to balance the sections.

CROSS-REFERENCED COURSES: The first course is the cross-referenced course and the **second** course is the "**Main**" course. Students have the option of signing up for the course under one of the two department headings. If you have a question about the course, or if it is designated as a "petition" course, please see the department that is listed **second (the main course)**.
