
Articulating why you are following your path

### The role of the essay in an application

#### Structure of the Essay

- Why are you pursuing your chosen path?
- How have you prepared for this path?
- What will you contribute to your patients/clients, your profession, and your community?

### Part II: Connect the Dots: Mind Mapping

- Review the answers that you have recorded with the purpose of connecting ideas together that seem related. You are looking for big, overarching themes about you.
- Some sample themes include
  - leadership influence, collaboration, teamwork
  - ability to work with people different from you
  - communication skills patience, listening, teaching,
  - Serving, helping
  - overcoming adversity
  - Research investigative, curious, critical thinking

Example: enjoy working with hands + enjoy watching films = creative expression

Link/ organize/ group the ideas using whatever system works for you

- According to my mind map, what themes stand out and make me memorable?
- Does it make sense to someone looking at my mind map that I want to become a
  ?
- If not, what am I missing to present as a good fit for the profession?
