

SEEKING STUDENT APPLICATIONS FOR Summer IDEaS

Schaffer Library is continuing its annual summer Digital Humanities (DH) research program, the Summer Institute for Digital Exploration at Schaffer (IDEaS). Summer IDEaS is a library-taught and paid research opportunity whose purpose is to introduce a small cohort of students from across the disciplines to DH. No experience with the Digital Humanities or digital scholarship more broadly is required to participate--just curiosity, excitement, and willingness to experiment and collaborate. The theme this summer is "Collections as Data," which we will explore by learning and applying digital tools and methods to digitized letters from Special Collections. This year's cohort will focus on data visualization, including network analysis, mapping, and text analysis. 
Welcome, Austin!

LIBRARY NEWS NEW DIGITAL COLLECTION: JONATHAN PEARSON DIARIES

Schaffer Library has digitized and made available the Ionathan Pearson Diaries. Pearson, UC class of 1835, "...devoted his life to the College's service, as professor of chemistry and botany, treasurer, and librarian," as Harold C. Martin, editor of Pearson's diaries, wrote. The diaries contain observations on events leading to the Civil War, accounts of travel in New York and Canada, and behind-the-scenes daily life at Union. With a grant from the Capital District Library Council, Schaffer Library digitized and described 10 volumes, from 1828-1841. Transcripts of the diaries were used by our inaugural 2021 Summer IDEaS cohort to create a new edited volume of the materials. with student essays, rich media content, and topic analysis rounding out Pearson's narrative.

MEDIEVAL MANUSCRIPTS DISCOVERED IN SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

Schaffer Library has rediscovered a collection of Medieval Manuscript leaves previously unknown to scholars, held at Special Collections. Known as the Ege (pronounced egg-ee) portfolios, they contain leaves from various manuscripts dating between the 13th to 15th centuries. Otto Ege, an art historian, book collector, and faculty member at Case Western Reserve University, created six portfolios in the 1930s and 1940s, and Union owns four: <u>Medieval Manuscripts 13th-15th Centuries</u> : <u>Original Leaves from Medieval Manuscripts</u> : <u>Original Leaves from Famous Books Eight Centuries, 1240A.D. – 1923A.D.</u> : <u>Original Leaves from Famous Books Fight Centuries, 1240A.D. – 1923A.D.</u> : <u>Original Leaves from Famous Books Nine Centuries, 1122A.D. – 1923A.D.</u> Though Ege purposefully divided the manuscript leaves, scholars have longed to reunite them. Union's discovery of heretofore unknown leaves provides a great opportunity to connect with Ege scholars and digitally recreate the manuscripts.

One fascinating leaf turns out to be from the <u>Beauvais Missal</u>, which scholars have been working to recreate digitally. Digital facsimiles of the manuscript leaves will be available later this year and some are available now upon request. UPDATES FROM THE PERMANENT COLLECTION & EXHIBITIONS

ADDENDA REOPENING IN LALLY READING ROOM

Due to repairs being done on the Nott Memorial, the current Mandeville Gallery exhibition, *Addenda*, is now in the Lally Reading Room on the first floor of Schaffer Library.

The new iteration of *Addenda* features the majority of artworks from the original exhibition. This includes four of the five pieces created in response to the collection of archival materials held in the college archive which details the life of missionary and the first general agent of education for the territory of Alaska, Sheldon Jackson (Class of 1855).

Featured contemporary artists are: Gina Adams (Ojibwe-not enrolled and colonial immigrants of Irish and Lithuanian descent), Merritt Johnson (lives/work on Lingít Aani, her family/partner's home territory in Sitka, Alaska), and Sonya Kelliher-Combs (Iñupiaq/Athabascan). Adams, Johnson, and Kelliher-Combs draw on history, cultural traditions, and archives, along with a strong belief in seeking alternative narratives, to create artworks that exist as a record of unconsidered perspectives and often unrecognized pasts.

Addenda is being held concurrently with *Sheldon Jackson: Our 'Other' Man in Alaska, 1835-1909 Union College Class of 1855,* mounted in the Beuth Atrium of the library by student-curator Matt Giarratana '23, that examines the Sheldon Jackson archive and Jackson's life.
