BIGELOW PROJECT GRANT UPDATE

Over Fall Term and Winter break, six students worked on the Bigelow Project, making great strides digitizing the collection's correspondence. Our students are scanning correspondence from 1912, and as of December 2022 over 21,000 letters have been scanned. In addition to digitizing the letters from the John Bigelow papers, the grant calls for scanning the collection's 20 scrapbooks that range from 55 to 600 pages. The scrapbooks were created by John, but family members added to them after his death. Newspaper clippings, newspapers, notes, correspondence, and announcements can be found in the scrapbooks, and they detail Bigelow's personal and professional accomplishments. Over the Winter Break, our students scanned 8 of these scrapbooks, and we'll be working on them in the coming term. Our thanks to these amazing students: Dimitris Vasileios Zora, '26; Dang Duong, '24; Darren Nguyen, '25; Minh Pham, '25; Henry Davenport, '26; and Tuan Trinh '24.

The Bigelow team has also been working on building a website that will enable crowdsourcing to transcribe the diaries of Jane Tunis Poultney Bigelow. Jane's diaries were written between 1850–1873 and narrate her life as she traveled around the world with her husband and children. The diaries were scanned when an NEH Act Cares grant was awarded to the library from the National Endowment for the Humanities in 2020, and fifteen of those diaries have been uploaded to the website. Currently, the Bigelow team is testing the <u>website</u> with a small group of volunteers.

To do this, <u>log into Primo</u>, then create a search. Click "Save Query" at the top of the result to save your search. To see your saved searches, click your name at the top of the screen, choose "My Favorites," and then "Saved Searches." Click the bell next to your search to start receiving emails whenever we add new items that match the search!

UPDATES FROM THE SPECIAL COLLECTIONS & ARCHIVES

HIGHLIGHTS FROM SPECIAL COLLECTIONS NEWLY DESCRIBED AND/OR ACQUIRED

The **Wayne Somers** *Encyclopedia of Union College History* files document the research and writing of the *Encyclopedia* publication in 2003. The collection builds upon the narrative offerings of the *Encyclopedia*, consisting of robust historical files relating to myriad topics in Union College history. The collection offers a convenient and compelling starting point for a wide range of inquiry and instruction.

The **Andrea Barrett ('74) papers** document the esteemed author's career and writing projects. From early 1970s Union College coursework to drafts of 2022's *Natural History*, materials in this collection provide insight into Barrett's interdisciplinary approach to research and writing historical fiction as influenced by her background in science.

The **Frank Parker Day collection** documents the only President of Union College forced to resign over ill health. The collection includes inaugural materials, correspondence, and appointment books from Day's largely forgotten but important presidency (1928–1933). Day not only led the College through the beginning of the Great Depression but was responsible for major curricular reforms and the founding of the Student Council.

In December we acquired <u>The Muses Library</u>; or <u>A series English Poetry from the Saxons to the Reign of</u> <u>King Charles II</u>. Published in London by J. Wilcox in 1737, this compilation is the first edition of the first compilation of English poetic miscellany by a woman, Elizabeth Cooper. This work served as a precursor to the better known historic anthologies compiled by Henry Headley, Robert Southey, and A.H. Bullen, all of whom profitably benefited from using Cooper's title. We are pleased to add this to our Rare Book Collection and hope faculty will find uses for it in their pedagogy.

WINTER TERM EXHIBITS AND EVENTS

- In Beuth Atrium you will find *Tales from the Picture File*. Since the invention of photography, members of the campus community have documented this history and their stories visually. Many such photographs are housed in the Picture File (SCA-1206), a collection of thousands of images preserved in the Special Collections and Archives department. SCA staff and students mined the collection for exceptional images documenting Union's student experience, campus scenes, and surrounding neighborhoods.
- In the Lally Reading Room take a look at *The Owls of Audubon* where we feature four of John James Audubon's original *Birds of North America* prints. Put your headphones on and scan the QR codes next to each owl and listen to their calls! • Created from rare books residing in the department of Special Collections and Archives, *Sex, Religion, and Politics: The Heterogeneous Library of John Bigelow* is a single case exhibit presenting a diverse assortment of books from the personal library of John Bigelow (1817-1911, UC 1835). The books on display range from 1700 to 1903, showcase seven different languages, and tell a story about how his personal and professional reading choices were partly responsible for shaping his open-mindedness and forward-thinking decision making.

LGBTQ+ @Union: Stronger Together

Location: Wikoff Student Gallery, 3rd floor of Nott Memorial

The 2022 edition of the biennial LGBTQ+ @ UNION exhibition has been extended. The exhibition explores ongoing, contemporary topics of the LGBTQ+ community, and highlights the effects of the past two years on art-making practices, politics, culture, communities, and shaping identities. LGBTQ+ @ Union, 2022: Stronger Together includes themes regarding transexual cultural inclusiveness, family pressures and coming out deliberations, and moving past a binary construct of gender identity. This year the exhibition includes work in drawing and painting, illustration, photography, book arts, and poetry by current Union College students, alumni, and professors.

This year's artists are: former Visiting Professor Elisa Bouhet, Emma Calarco ('22), Victoria Donatacci ('23), Crystal Flax ('22), Albert Gilewicz ('75), and Professor Randy Wyatt.
