Theatre is a strange addiction.

I think Miles discovers that himself in this play. When he starts hearing voices and encountering spirits of characters, he knows he's not doing just some pageant anymore, and he's ready to chuck his livelihood and start a brand-new life, a life in the theatre. If I had a nickel for every time, I watched this happen to someone. Thank God it does and beware, it does.

This strange fable is set in the Prohibition era, long before society had had to confront "alternative lifestyles" and the truths of a spectrum of gender expression. Watching Casper's journey makes me reflect on how many moments were stomped out and erased because of this false binary, by external forces to be sure but also interpersonally, because there just weren't words for that impulse to rest your head on someone's shoulder if you both shared the same gender, or if society thought you did. These life impacting moments with no name for them, so you keep them to yourself.

The residents of Wattleburg discover that stepping into the heels of someone else expands their consciousness to the point of realizing that these moments have weight even if they had no name. They live in a fable where active



empathy unlocks so much. It's a power that transforms the people around them, too. It's a heady power that began as a joke—men in skirts. As if that itself is a punchline, and not just an indicator of how limited our vision of gender is, or our arrogance that there's only one right way to look at all of it. To experience it.

That kind of consciousness expanding is addictive.
